CHAIR'S REPORT



It gives me great pleasure to present this, the 12th annual report of the Auckland Airport Communities Trust. Since its establishment in 2003 the Trust has made grants totalling just over \$3.4 million to assist the people living and working in our Area of Benefit.

The trustees welcome this annual opportunity to report to you on the results achieved from these distributions within your community and the positive social impact the Trust strives for to help mitigate the adverse effects associated with aircraft operations.

COMMUNITY GRANTS

In the year under review the Trust granted just under \$300,000 on commitments from the June 2014 funding round. This was distributed to nine community projects supporting literacy and life skills initiatives within the Area of Benefit. Delivery of these programmes is well underway. Two of the 2014 recipients share their encouraging results with us in this report.

The final accountability reports of the 2013 recipients have also been most gratifying with over 6,600 people engaged and 1,145 youth professionals supported in the funded initiatives. This highlights the breadth of the difference we are making to the lives of the people who live or work within our Area of Benefit.

This year's funding round was again well subscribed and the calibre of applicants was extremely high. Requests for funding totalled just under \$2 million highlighting the immense need for support within the broader region of South Auckland.

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

The annual payment from Auckland International Airport Limited from which the grants are made was \$327,047. This amount was set in 2003 at \$250,000 and is adjusted annually by the compounded value of the CPI. With investment returns, the Trust's total income was \$348,546.

The balance sheet shows unpaid distributions of \$311,823 which represents the forward commitments of the approved 2015 grants.

The Trust ended the year with a surplus of \$49,613 and Endowment Fund Reserves of \$106,445.

GOVERNANCE

I acknowledge the commitment of my fellow Trustees and the responsible manner they have adopted to administer the Trust. Their dedication and compassion are invaluable. I would like to take the opportunity to thank Katie Moore, our outgoing Auckland International Airport Limited appointee and also welcome Simon Lambourne who will shortly take on this position.

I extend a thank you to the Trust's Administrators, Auckland Communities Foundation for providing support and invaluable knowledge allowing the Board to work effectively and efficiently.

And finally my sincere thanks to our Appointers, our community stakeholders and grant recipients. We recognise the needs within our community and appreciate your dedication towards meeting these needs and making a positive difference in the lives of the families in our Area of Benefit. Through our trusteeship it has been an honour to serve and support you.

De La Salle College

COMMUNITY SERVICES - CHANGING LIVES

The Community Service Co-ordinator Position at De La Salle College has been funded by the Auckland Airport Community Trust. Deputy Principal Dermot English shares how the Community Service Programme can have a life changing effect on the students;

“At the start of 2014 we decided to make community service compulsory for all the boys at the school, ranging from 10-20 hours per week. I could see that we were not going to progress unless we had a coordinator to help students overcome obstacles such as shyness and also to help alleviate any concerns their parents had with their sons doing something different to the norm.

The co-ordinator began the programme and had immediate success. Last year we had 22 boys who started Yr 11 but did not finish for a range of reasons such as behavioural and offending issues. One of these students tried to start a gang in Term One. He is the eldest of five, with Dad coming and going, and domestic violence issues thrown in. He exemplifies for me the young men who need a mountain to climb - they need an adventure. I brought him to the attention of the coordinator who connected him immediately to the local Rotary Club. In a short space of time he helped at a sausage sizzle, planted shrubs in a reserve, served at the White Ribbon fundraiser, helped out at Friendship House, and spent Polyfest and Pacifica working with NIU FM. He still struggles with home issues, but he has something that he is good at and that he is being recognised for. Because of his track record of service I was able to credibly include him in a 20-day service trip this December to Hong Kong and Manila. Meanwhile nearly every one of his ‘friends’ left school.

In Term 2 this year our coordinator began to connect boys with a range of other groups and activities. These include four boys collecting over \$1000 for Red Cross in Manukau, to having three boys as Youthline counsellors, three boys doing regular shifts on the help-desk at Middlemore, 30 boys picking up rubbish outside the school and a group of boys making regular visits to the Monte Cecilia Housing Trust to spend time with children in emergency housing. I could go on, but the point is that the Coordinator is part of creating those ‘trigger’ moments in boys lives, where an experience changes their view. This of course makes it completely invaluable”.

“This initiative enables students to give back to their communities, things like painting over graffiti, cleaning streams and water ways as well as tree planting, they now see it as taking care of their environment as opposed to dumping rubbish anywhere and or tagging fences. A lot of things that we do with the students are either a humbling experience, or an eye opener. I am so pleased to have a position where I get to help these boys do such positive things for the community and for themselves.”

Brainwave Trust

EVERY CHILDHOOD MATTERS

Research tells us that consistent, responsive and loving care by a parent during a child’s first few years of life supports healthy brain development. At Brainwave we speak up about the importance of early brain development and its life long effects on every child’s physical, social, intellectual and emotional development and wellbeing.

We take our message to as many audiences as we can so that they have the awareness, understanding and motivation to ensure all children get the best start in life, free from neglect and abuse.

An area of significant importance has been getting this message to the next generation, mainly through schools. The Auckland Airport Community Trust’s (AACT) committed support to the Brainwave Trust Schools Programme since 2011 has allowed our programme to grow from one school to five; now reaching more than 2,000 students annually in AACT’s area of benefit.

“The education and service Brainwave Trust provides is so valuable. It is directly impacting on the wellbeing of children in New Zealand and has the power to impact a whole generation. Every young person and parent in New Zealand should have the opportunity to learn about how what we do as parents and whanau can help or hinder our children and their long term wellbeing and future success.” – Linda Moses, Director, Tangaroa College Teen Parent Unit

The programme has also been successfully used to foster youth literacy by providing relevant and engaging topics from which assessments can be based in schools. As a result of attending our schools programme students gain the knowledge and confidence to nurture and value every child because they understand the impact early experiences have on the developing brain.

“When the baby is growing up it’s the most important time in their life. You only get one brain. One day when I become a father I will use this information for my children” – Year 9 Student

Through the programme we aim to ensure that every childhood does matter. The support we receive from AACT goes a long way to helping us achieve this aim.



1 Statement of Accounting Policies**A Reporting Entity**

The financial statements presented here are for the reporting entity Auckland Airport Community Trust (the Trust). The Trust is a charitable trust under the Charitable Trusts Act 1957. The Trust is reporting pursuant to the requirements of its trust deed.

B Statutory Base

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the reporting requirements of the Financial Reporting Act 2013. The Trust is a charitable trust incorporated under the Charitable Trusts Act 1957.

C Financial Reporting Framework

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with 'old GAAP' in New Zealand. Old GAAP comprises New Zealand Financial Reporting standards and Statements of Standard Accounting Practice that existed prior to the introduction of New Zealand Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards. The Trust has chosen to apply old GAAP because it meets the criteria for doing so; that is, it was applying old GAAP at 30 June 2014, and it is neither publicly accountable nor large as defined in the External Reporting Board's Standard A1: Application of Accounting Standards. The Minister of Commerce has approved a new Accounting Standards Framework (incorporating a Tier Strategy) developed by the External Reporting Board (XRB). Under this Accounting Standards Framework, the Trust is classified as a Tier 3 reporting entity and will be required to apply Public Benefit Entities simple Format Reporting standard - Accrual (PSFR - A). These standards are being developed by the XRB based on current international Public Sector Accounting Standards. The effective date for the new standards for not for profit entities is expected to be for reporting periods beginning on or after 1 April 2015. This means the Trust expects to transition to the new standards in preparing its 30 June 2016 financial statements.

D Differential Reporting

The Trust is a qualifying entity within the New Zealand Institute of Chartered Accountants' differential reporting framework. The entity qualifies for differential reporting exemptions in the absence of public accountability and the entity is not large in terms of the size criteria. The entity has taken advantage of all differential reporting concessions available to it, with the exception of FRS 19 Accounting for Goods & Services Tax, with which it has complied fully.

E Measurement Base

The measurement base adopted is that of historical cost. Reliance is placed on the Trust being a going concern.

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand Dollars (NZD) rounded to the nearest dollar.

f: NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

F Taxation

The Trust is a registered charitable organisation with the Charities Commission, and therefore exempted from the payment of income tax.

G Particular Accounting Policies

The following particular accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position of the Trust have been applied:

Grants

Grants and donations are recorded as revenue at the point their receipts are formally acknowledged by the Trust. The Trust is funded primarily by Auckland International Airport Limited.

Bank Term Deposits

Bank term deposits are comprised of deposits with a fixed term more than one month but less than twelve months from the date of acquisition.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts Receivable is stated at their estimated realisable value after providing for doubtful debts.

Goods and Services Tax

The financial statements have been prepared on a GST inclusive basis.

Trustee Funds

Trustee funds comprise of accumulated surplus over the years, Endowment Fund Reserves and Hardship Grant Reserves. Endowment Funds Reserves are funds left to build up and be used for major community projects at some future date. Hardship Grants Reserves are funds set aside for future approved hardship grant distributions.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies and they have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous period.

9 Grants Cancelled

Previous Grant of \$860 and \$36,442 paid to Aorere College and Great Potentials respectively was refunded during the year. In 2014, a grant of \$36,000 to Great Potentials was cancelled.

To the trustees of Auckland Airport Community Trust Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the financial statements of Auckland Airport Community Trust (sections c to f of this report), which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2015, and the statement of financial performance and statement of movements in trustee funds for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Trustees' Responsibility for the Financial Statements

The Trustees are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand and for such internal control as the Trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand). Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Our firm carries out business advisory services for Auckland Airport Community Trust. Except in this regard, and other than our capacity as auditors, the firm has no other relationship with, or interest in, Auckland Airport Community Trust.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements (in sections c to f of this report) present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Auckland Airport Community Trust as at 30 June 2015, and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand.
