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What we do

The Trust's work

Auckland Airport set up the Auckland Airport Community Trust in 2003, following a decision by the Environment Court to approve a second runway. The Court decision required the airport to grant the Trust \$250,000 (adjusted by the Consumer Price Index) each year. The Trust distributes this money to the community around the airport to mitigate the impacts of aircraft noise and generate positive social benefits.

Noise mitigation grants

Aircraft noise is an issue for airports around the world. Auckland Airport mitigates the impacts of aircraft noise in its neighbourhood in several ways, including by helping affected people install noise mitigation packages in their homes. The airport pays 100% of installation costs in the High Aircraft Noise Area (HANA) and 75% in the Moderate Aircraft Noise Area (MANA). People in the MANA who are in financial hardship can apply to the Trust for funding to cover the remaining 25% of the cost.

Community grants

In past years the noise mitigation grants have made up a small share of the total funds available for distribution. Based on the Trust Deed, trustees have distributed surplus funds to the community in the Trust's 'area of benefit' as community grants. In past years the focus has been to support learning, literacy and life skills. In 2019 the trustees have widened this focus to benefit a greater range of people and activities.

Responsive grants

In 2019 the Trust introduced a new micro-grant funding scheme. This grantmaking programme is designed to be responsive. Enabling a flexible approach to the changing conditions and needs of the community. The aim is to get small grants, to a maximum of \$2,500 to organisations quickly and easily to meet their immediate and small-scale needs.



Chair's report

It is with pleasure that I present this Annual Report for the year ended 30 June 2023 on behalf of the Auckland Airport Community Trust.

The Trust was formally established through a Trust Deed signed on December 11, 2003, and officially registered on January 9, 2004. This development followed an earlier ruling by the Environment Court, which mandated that funds from the Airport Company would be annually allocated to the Trust for the benefit of residents and community projects within a specific geographic area referred to as the "area of benefit."

This area was defined in relation to aircraft noise levels.

Over the years, the Trust has provided community grants totalling more than \$5.5 million along with hardship grants to support noise mitigation efforts initiated by the Airport Company. Thanks to significant housing development within the "area of benefit," many older homes now benefit from noise mitigation measures, resulting in reduced payment requirements. This, in turn, allows for greater funding to be channelled into community grants.

In the 2022/23 fiscal year, the Trust allocated a total of \$300,032 in grants to 23 charitable organisations making valuable contributions to the community. Some of these organisations include Te Whakaora Tangata, Diabetes New Zealand, The Woven Earth Trust, and RNZ Plunket. The local South Auckland community has faced substantial challenges due to severe flooding and weather events this year, prompting the Trust to prioritise sustainability, recovery, and resilience efforts.

The dedication of your trustees in meticulously assessing every application cannot be overstated. In general, we remain delighted with the diverse array of community organisations that are reaping the rewards from the community grant round.

Administration

Natalie Vincent remains an invaluable asset as our Trust Manager. She has been a part of our team since 2018, offering exceptional administrative support to the Trustees. Natalie not only offers top-tier support but also stands out by closely collaborating with various applicant organisations, whether they are successful or not in their applications. Her wealth of experience enables her to provide valuable guidance in a wide range of areas.

Financial

The Trust has been relatively insulated from the current global economic and health challenges as its funding is secured through the Airport Company. We have diligently managed our expenses and in the fiscal year ending 30 June 2023, we have a small deficit of \$1,318. This decision was driven by the Trustees' choice to increase community support. Our main priority is dealing with noise mitigation package grants, and the determination to allocate a more substantial sum to support the community is contingent on the final requirement for these packages, during the year we did not receive any applications for financial hardship assistance. We continue to have adequate reserves which currently are at a level of \$374,322. However, a substantial portion of \$418,151 will be distributed this month, with specific grant details to be unveiled at the Annual Public Meeting on November 7. As always, our financial accounts have

undergone thorough auditing.

Governance and Appreciation

This year, we bid farewell to one of our Trustees, Noel Robinson, and we extend our heartfelt gratitude for his nine years of dedicated service. We are pleased to welcome Suzy Mitchell, the Auckland Council appointee, who has replaced Noel.

I would like to take this moment to express our sincere appreciation to all our Trustees and Natalie for their unwavering commitment to the Trust's work. To all the grant recipients, we extend our gratitude for the valuable services and projects you provide to our community. By working together, we can and will create a positive meaningful impact.

Auckland Airport

Auckland Airport has once again had the privilege of contributing to a diverse range of projects with local charities, schools and social enterprises. These projects span across recreational, cultural, and other activities, all of which share a common thread: they are designed to support, uplift, educate and inspire our local community in South Auckland.

This past year certainly hasn't been without its challenges, from coming out the other side of the pandemic, to then being hit with flooding, closely followed by Cyclone Gabrielle.

It has been inspiring to see so many organisations rally to help others in need and we're incredibly proud to have played a role here in supporting them where possible.

In the 2023 financial year, Auckland Airport granted the Trust \$395,519 to support opportunities that benefit the health, well being and education for local people, with a particular focus on infant, youths and families.

There were a total of 23 groups that received funding in this past year. This included the Big Buddy Mentoring Trust who help to pair male figures with boys who have lost their fathers (\$10,000); Littlemore Trust who help provide essential baby items to families in need (\$15,000); and the Graeme Dingle Foundation who run a programme for 14-16-year-olds with wilderness adventure, community challenges and mentoring (\$12,500).

We also gave out an additional 13 micro grants, two of which were in response to the flooding to Kiwi Harvest. This organisation used the funds (\$5,000) to help a further 25 charities purchase fresh produce for locals affected by the floods.

Communicare

The photos I attached represent the centres. The centres have been running for many years and Communicare has since 1959. A new Center is opening in Manurewa

The members are very insistent when a new centre opens that we don't open it on the same day as other South Centres as they like to go to a few Centers a week. Manukau, Papatoetoe members will go to Manurewa and a new one soon in Mangere. We work closely with occupational therapists to ensure that all activities compliment the cognitive skills of all members.

The exercises are balanced focused to ensue balance and ensuring members can prevent falling.

The centres have been running for many years and Communicare has since 1959.

The disabled and introverted members love doing crafts and colouring in books. They are happy to sit and do these while listening and watching the noisier group.

They love Communicare often telling us that it is the only reason they get out of bed.

Communicare is more than activities. We have a wraparound service ensuring members are ok. We have Advocates who check in if a member does not turn up and we will also ensure they have transport arranged if they need it. We work closely with support services and aged concern where we have a memorandum of understanding so they can bring their clients to the groups.

Helping Paws Charitable Trust

The Helping Paws Charitable Trust is an independent animal rescue that provides services across Auckland and Northland. The Trust was established in 2019 to help with a growing problem in both regions – unwanted cats and kittens being born and being left to fend for themselves in our local communities. When left to fend for themselves, they become a threat to local wildlife as they have no option but to search for their own source of food.

While the SPCA does an immense amount of work in this area, the reality is they cannot tackle this problem alone. Every year, the SPCA is forced to put a hold on cats and kittens coming into their centres, as they simply do not have the resources to cope with the volume.

This Rescue Centre is run entirely by volunteers and provides a vital overflow service to the SPCA and other independent rescuers. Helping Paws operates one of only a few independent, purpose-built Animal Rescue Centres in New Zealand. This Rescue Centre is run entirely by volunteers and provides a vital overflow service to the SPCA and other independent rescuers. The Trust's core focus is reducing the environmental impact of unwanted cats and kittens being born, by offering to desex cats free of charge, and taking custody of unwanted kittens from the local community. Every cat or kitten that comes into Helping Paws leaves desexed, vaccinated, microchipped, registered and insured. This ensures they do not go on to continue the cycle of having kittens of their own.

Helping Paws was the very grateful recipient of a \$10,520 grant from AACT in 2022, to help extend its work in the South Auckland community. The suburbs surrounding Auckland Airport are home to the majority of the cats and kittens Helping Paws takes in each year. The Trust has helped families in South Auckland who have started out with one female cat who they didn't desex, and have ended up with over thirty cats and kittens in a little over a year. The problem spirals far more quickly than many people realise.

The AACT grant enabled the Trust to purchase fibreglass veterinary cages for the maternity suite in their Animal Rescue Centre. These cages provide a temporary home for pregnant cats to give birth to their babies, and provide a safe haven for both mums and newborns during their first few weeks of life, before they go on to foster care in private homes. Helping Paws operates a network of over one hundred foster families across the Auckland region. The Trust provides each foster home with all the food, kitty litter and equipment they need to raise a litter of kittens to the point that they are old enough to be desexed and adopted into forever homes.

Entity's Purpose or Mission:

The Auckland Airport Community Trust's purpose is to hold and apply the Trust Fund upon trust for the following charitable purposes for the benefit of those living and working in the Area of Benefit and affected by noise from Aircraft Operations:

(a) for the mitigation of the adverse effects associated with noise from Aircraft Operations which are not provided for under the Operative Manukau District Plan 2002;

(b) to ensure positive effects on the external environment to offset the other adverse effects, including but not limited to the provision of opportunities and facilities to provide enhanced cultural, recreational and other opportunities to those living and working in the Area of Benefit.

(c) in cases of significant financial hardship, to assist property owners in the Area of Benefit to meet their share of any costs of acoustic treatment measures or enhancements where such a contribution by an owner is required by the above mentioned District Plan.

Entity Structure:

The Auckland Airport Community Trust appoints Trustees to govern the Trust. The number of Trustees at any time shall always be five. Each Appointer of the Trust has the power to appoint and remove the number of Trustees specified below;

- Auckland Airport Limited (Settlor) Two Trustees
- Auckland City Council Two Trustees
- Aircraft Noise Community Consultative Group One Trustee

Main Sources of the Entity's Cash and Resources:

Auckland International Airport Limited (Settlor) is required to contribute the sum of \$250,000*, or the adjusted sum to compensate for inflation, per annum to the Fund. The Trust also receives interest on invested funds.

The requests to the Trust for the funding round that closed on 12th August 2022 exceeded \$806,407.67. This required the Trust to be very selective in its decision making. The distribution was made to a broad range of organisations across the Trust's funding priorities.

Micro-funding Grants In the year to 30 June 2023 the Trust approved 13 micro-grants.

Financial Assistance

Auckland Airport covers 100% of the cost of installing noise mitigation packages in homes in the High Aircraft Noise Area (HANA) around the airport. The package includes a ventilation system to circulate fresh air through the home, a heat pump to provide heating and cooling and a kitchen extraction fan to allow windows to be closed. Auckland Airport covers 75% of the cost of installing this package in the Moderate Aircraft Noise Area (MANA). People in the MANA suffering financial hardship can apply to the Trust for funding to cover the remaining 25%.

Depreciation




